"NEIGHBOR LABOR" IMPROVES OUR PARK

On Saturday, June 12th, Dale Allen, Chairman of the Parks and Improvements Committee, and a hot but hearty crew of twelve assembled at Optimist Park for the second workday of our "Neighborhood Volunteers in the Park Pilot Program". By 1:30 that afternoon, they had finished the following tasks: Touch-up painted the interior walls; Patched the ceiling; Painted kitchen area; Filled in a hole in front of the building; planted day lilies behind the boxwoods and near the flag pole; and completely weeded one of the tot lots.

In all, a total of fifty-one hours of "neighbor labor" was supplied by the volunteers. While a lot was accomplished during this and the first workday las February, there is much that still needs to be done. In a letter to the City Parks and Recreation Department reporting on the workday, Dale outlined a long list of ideas such as: more interior painting and entire exterior painting of the building; replacement of the windows in the building; improved ventilation and additional landscaping.

The City Commission and the Parks and Recreation Department have been crucial to this program by providing materials and other assistance. They recently installed a security light on one side of the Scout House. We look forward to their continued cooperation as we work together for the betterment of our park.


MEMBERSHIP REPORT
