## OPTIMIST CLUB GIVES RECREATION DEPARTMENT \$5,000 FOR PARK IMPROVEMENTS

The Optimist Club of Tallahassee, a long time benefactor of the Optimist Park and other recreational programs in Tallahassee, has donated \$5,000 to the Friends of the Parks Foundation, which will be used exclusively for improvements at the Optimist Park in Indianhead Acres. The gift will be used to purchase a new piece of playground equipment, to repave the basketball court, to complete landscaping and the split rail fence around the park and to continue repairs and renovations for the Scout House. The City Recreation and Parks Department will coordinate the improvements and will budget an additional \$2,000 for the project.

The gift was arranged by Randy Trousdale and Sue McCollum and by representatives of the Neighborhood Association. Our thanks to Randy and Sue and to Joe Cook and Earl Lambert of the Optimist Club, for their support and this generous gift.

This is great news for our neighborhood and a fantastic incentive to continue neighborhood participation in park maintenace and repairs. It all helps to make Indianhead/Lehigh and Tallahassee a great place to live.

### IT'S MEMBERSHIP TIME

Dues are payable at the beginning of the second quarter of the year(to coincide with the annual springtime events) and must be paid before you can vote at the annual election in the spring. (1985 dues should be paid now.)

The dues are used to support the Association activities (see the article below). THE NEWSLETTER IS ONLY MAILED TO MEMBERS except for the spring issue which is distributed to all homes in the neighborhood.

## WHAT IS THE NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION?

The Indian Head/Lehigh Neighborhood Association was formed in 1981 by a group of neighbors who wanted to protect and improve our fine neighborhood. They also thought it would be a good idea to get organized in advance of any major issues. The following is a list of some of the Neighborhood Association activities.

- -Publish quarterly <u>Newsletters</u> to keep members informed of Association activities and important neighborhood issues.
- -Maintain a computerized <u>mailing list</u> of members and of all addresses in the neighborhood.
- -Sponsor Neighborhood Crime Watch program.
- -Monitor zoning issues. There have been several major zoning change requests in recent years and we have been effective in protecting neighborhood interests. This year, partly as a result of work done by the Neighborhood Association, a major down zoning of the Old St. Augustine Road area was adopted by the City Commission.
- -Annual neighborhood Flea Market.
- -Halloween block party.
- -Christmas Caroling.
- -Park Improvement Project. We have organized four workdays in the park where we did everything from painting the equipment and weeding the totlot to planting trees and bushes. We were also able to get the city to make many improvements such as the new windows for the Scout House. And a gift of \$5,000 has been given to the Friends of the Parks for renovations to Optimist Park by the Tallahassee Optimist Club. You should be able to see big changes in the park due to their generous contribution.
