Hazardous Waste "Round-up"

Clearing out your shed or garage as part of your spring cleaning and have no idea if that old can of paint/solvent/etc is still good? Or are you finished with some home project and have leftover stain, varnish, or paint? Or what about that mysterious bottle of something left behind from previous owner? All of these constitute potential or real hazardous household wastes that should not be put in your regular garbage or down the drain. You can easily and safely

dispose of those household hazardous products that you no longer use, want, or need. The county will be sending its Hazardous Waste truck to Optimist Park on May 17, 2008. In addition to clearing out your old collections of various paints, solvents, car batteries and more. you can also bring in old electronics. See the flyer in this newsletter for more details on the products you can "round up" from your house, garage, and yard.

Please remember that these items should not be put into your trash can or left on the curbside for pickup, as they contain toxic components that need special handling. If you can't make it to the neighborhood round-up on May 17th, you can take your hazardous material to the county landfill on Apalachee Parkway free of charge.


2nd Annual July 4th Bike Parade

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
Need to sell your home? Want to make it attractive for a future sale? Here are some tips from Terry Anne Kant (Broker and 18 year Indian Head resident) in this currently challenging market.

- If you have lived in it for more than 3 years, consider a home inspection. This eliminates surprises later on and allows you to have your home in top shape.
- Curb appeal means a lot. Most people purchase homes that they've admired from the street or were drawn to by pictures of the exterior. Simple and natural landscaping, potted plants at the entry, clean home and driveway, fresh paint on eaves and trim, etc. all add to initial reaction.
- Relatively inexpensive updates like a fresh coat of paint, window treatments, light/fan fixtures, new knobs on cabinets, sometimes new flooring, all make your home stand out. Often making smaller cosmetic changes to kitchens and baths are enough to perk them up.
- Clutter may be great for that cozy lived in feeling, but buyers need to see themselves in your space, so personal pictures, a refrigerator crowded with magnets, and cluttered desks and tables are distracting. Furniture that is too large also crowds a space. If you are planning to sell soon, start packing up items you won't need every day and store them. This will also make your eventual move easier. Remove some of the personal pictures.
- Price to sell. Don't base it on how much you want for your next new house, or the cost of updates you've done. Price it to attract lookers/buyers who are ever more savvy. The current market drives the eventual price and Indian Head has slowed like most neighborhoods. Over priced homes aren't getting shown or sold as quickly. Our diversity of home sizes & amenities complicate pricing. Most Realtors will provide a free market analysis.
- Marketing. If you plan to sell your house yourself rather than use a Realtor, be sure you've
 consulted with an attorney about proper forms, etc. and try Craigslist for free. Virtual tours,
 flyers, and being quickly reached by potential buyers are helpful.
